*From the City Manager, Brandon M. Lovett*

On behalf of the City of Sherrill employees and administration I'd like to wish everyone a Happy & Healthy 2018. We're excited for the new year and the opportunities that ahead. In 2017 residents saw the completion of the Power & Light Building, the start of work and progress on the DPW building renovation, some improvements at the CAC, and the completion of the Betsinger Road sidewalk including a pedestrian crosswalk on Route 5. 2017 also saw a spike in private development with the Maple Leaf Market, Greenhouse Brew, Briggs & Stratton and a few other new small businesses. To follow up on a successful 2017, we are wrapping up planning for our 2018 construction projects and our spring/summer recreation and community programs.

The City recently hosted an Economic Development Workshop with Mohawk Valley EDGE which provided insight and technical assistance to entrepreneurs, business and property owners seeking new opportunities. On February 7<sup>th</sup> we'll host a follow up to the fall recreation meeting to discuss activities, programs and facilities the community would like to see. We welcome your input in implementing fresh ideas.

We're scheduling our summer concert series and we'll announce our 2018 lineup soon. The fireworks weekend entertainment is confirmed, and we're excited to announce that Last Left will perform on Friday July 27 and Soul Injection will perform on Saturday July 28. We're planning the 5K race and introducing a new twist to the golf tournament- it will be a 9-hole Thursday evening event. Details about these events are coming soon.

The City was successful in the NYS Consolidated Funding application program for the first time. We received \$30K for waste water planning. This will allow us to do engineering work needed to compete for large scale funding and upcoming mandates required for disinfection. Senator Joseph A. Griffo was instrumental in helping Sherrill secure \$75K to replace the generator at the Waste Water Treatment Plant. Senator Griffo also helped secure \$10K from the Department of Criminal Justice Services for public safety equipment. The Community Foundation provided \$4K for a new ADA and pet friendly drinking fountain for Robertson Park. We also received \$8K from the Oneida County Youth Bureau for youth summer employment. We'll continue to explore 2018 grant opportunities starting with NYS Department of Transportation PSAP and TAP grants.

The Police Department has hired a new full-time officer, patrolman Joseph Pruckno, who joined the force in November. Officer Pruckno came to Sherrill as a lateral transfer from the City of Rome. Pruckno is a US Navy Veteran and served in Afghanistan. He is a reserve member of the Air Force Security Forces EADS 224 Attack Squadron, a Utica College graduate and Athletic All American. He is married and has a daughter. Welcome aboard Joe, we are glad to have you on our team.

In closing, I encourage our citizens to continue to stay involved. Local government is most successful when we have input from our community to help guide and direct the City's planning. One of the most important roles of local government is to be accessible. Organic ideas, suggestions and involvement will help us to continue to move in a positive direction. **Assessor's News**

March 1, 2018 is the deadline for filing certain property tax exemption applications. Many exemptions including the Senior Citizen's and Enhanced STAR exemptions do not automatically renew and require annual applications and proof of qualifying income.

The Senior Citizen's exemption, with far lower income limits than the Enhanced STAR exemption, is normally based on the previous year's income. For the Senior Citizen's exemption, you must provide proof of your previous year's income. Form SS 1099 and tax returns are often needed to prove your income level. Please also bring in receipts for out-of-pocket unreimbursed medical and prescription expenses, such as dental, health insurance premium payments, eyeglasses, hearing aids, etc.) which are used to reduce your income.

*Eligibility for Enhanced Star is based on being 65 years old, regardless of when you turn 65 during 2018, and 2016 income.* Those applying for Enhanced STAR exemption may elect to participate in a voluntary program whereby the Assessor's office is automatically notified in future years regarding the income eligibility of the applicant. This process is only for those filing New York income tax returns. Applications for the program are available at the Assessor's office and cannot be used for any other income-related exemption.

If you purchased a residence in Sherrill **prior to May 1, 2014** and have **NOT** previously applied for the Basic STAR exemption, you may qualify for this significant property tax exemption designed to lower your school tax bill. The residence must be your primary residence each year to qualify. Renewal to continue the Basic Star exemption is NOT necessary. \*Important Changes: For homeowners who purchased property after May 1, 2014 both the Basic & Enhanced STAR programs have changed. Bob Comis, Assessor for the City of Sherrill, has set the following times to process exemptions at City Hall: January 11 & 12 9am-12pm for Enhanced STAR; All exemptions- February 1, 2, 7, 8, 12-14, 21-23, 27 & 28, 9am-12pm. Changes to this schedule will be posted at [www.sherrillny.org](http://www.sherrillny.org). An appointment can also be scheduled by contacting Bob, (315) 264-6362. Property owners considering construction this year are welcome to meet with Bob to discuss the potential change to your City assessed value.

The Town of Vernon Assessor's Office welcomes inquiries from all town property owners, residents, and taxpayers. Sherrill residents can receive some of the same services that they receive from the Sherrill Assessor's Office at the Vernon office, including assistance relating to exemption applications. The Vernon Assessor's hours are Monday & Thursday, 9am-2pm through the month of February. Frank Laguzza, (315) 829-2587, is the Chairman of the Vernon Board of Assessors.

**Garbage Statistic-** The City of Sherrill generates an average of 4 tons of electronic waste per year.

\*The following are some violations that are still occurring:

- Garbage can & contents combined total weight over 40 lbs. Please cover garbage and recyclable cans. Rainwater & snow significantly increase the weight to unsafe handling limits for the sanitation crew.
- Recyclables not loose, but stuffed in plastic bags.
- Cardboard not broken down.

**Bags-** Empty plastic wood pellet bags and other plastic film items (i.e. grocery bags) can be brought to Hannaford, Price Chopper, Target, and Tops for proper recycling. For wood pellet bags please cut off the top of the bag so that the corners are removed and shake out any leftover residue. Bags must be clean and dry.

**Winter Reminders-** Please do not place garbage cans or recyclables in the sidewalk because it interferes with sidewalk clearing. Please place containers at the edge of your driveway between the sidewalk and road.

### Notes and News from "The Hall"

-City Commission meetings are held at City Hall in the City Court room on the 2<sup>nd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Monday of every month at 7pm. The schedule may fluctuate due to holidays and during June, July and August. Contact City Hall or check the city website for the updated schedule.

-The 2018 City budget was passed at the December 11 meeting. There was a slight tax increase (2.4%) from \$7.13 to \$7.30 per \$1,000 assessed value. For a \$100,000 home this equates to \$17. This is the first increase since 2015. The City has completed and continues to work on some major projects including the Police and DPW building renovations and construction of the new P&L building.

-Additionally, the water and sewer rates will increase slightly both from \$3.30 to \$3.40 per 100 cu. ft. The customer charge increases from \$9.45 to \$12.50 per billing. This represents an annual increase of \$18.30 for both utilities.

-The city is now taking credit card, debit card and EFT payments, and offers pay by phone or text for utility billings. You can get reminder alerts, schedule reoccurring payments, or get your utility bill e-mailed to you directly. Use F.A.S.T. to remember stroke warning signs: **F-** Face: Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop? **A-** Arms: Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift down? **S-** Speech: Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Is their speech slurred or strange? **T-** Time: If you observe any of these signs, call 911 immediately.

#### **Snow blower Safety Tips-** from [assh.org](http://assh.org)

- Work at a brisk pace. The faster the blades and pace, the less likely snow is going to stick.
- If heavy, wet snow is anticipated, consider snow blowing several times during the snowfall.
- Some people spray the blades and chute with cooking oil spray. This may help.
- If your snow blower clogs- TURN IT OFF! Disengage the clutch and wait five seconds after shutting off the machine to allow the impeller blades to stop rotating.
- ALWAYS use a stick or broom handle to clear impacted snow. NEVER put your hand down the chute or around the blades.
- Keep all shields in place. DO NOT REMOVE the safety devices on the machine.
- Keep hands and feet away from all moving parts.

**Candle Fire Safety-** There are an estimated 15,260 fires caused by candles each year. If you use candles, ensure they're in sturdy metal, glass or ceramic holders and placed where they won't be easily knocked down. Avoid using candles in bedrooms and sleeping areas and extinguish them after use and before going to bed. Keep candles at least 12 inches from flammable objects. Never use a candle where medical oxygen is being used as the two can combine to create a large, unexpected fire. Always use a flashlight for emergency lighting. NEVER leave burning candles unattended!

#### **Fireplace Safety-** via [clean-organized-family-home.com](http://clean-organized-family-home.com)

- Become a Soot Stopper.** Minimize the buildup of soot and creosote by using seasoned hardwood or manufactured logs which burn cleaner than real wood.
- Know about hot stuff.** If you do use manufactured logs, be sure to follow the directions on the bag. These logs burn hotter than regular wood and can potentially warp metal chimneys if you burn more than one at a time.
- Burn only simple stuff.** Only burn wood or manufactured logs. Fancy finishes like glossy wrapping paper, shiny bows and foam peanuts release toxic fumes. Never burn holiday greenery- it releases nasty stuff you don't want your family to breathe.
- Go for a slow burn.** Though a roaring fire looks attractive, it's not as safe as a slower, steadier burn. Also, a too-hot fire can crack your chimney- just burn a couple of logs at a time.
- Open the damper before you light your fire.** Open the damper before starting a fire in the fireplace. Keep the damper open until the fire is completely extinguished.
- Open fireplace doors.** Open the fireplace doors (if your fireplace has them), and use a fireplace safety screen when you've got the fire crackling.
- Keep the area around the fireplace clear.** Don't position your Christmas tree or anything else near the fireplace. If embers spark out of the fireplace you want to make sure there is nothing nearby that will catch fire.
- Don't leave a fire unattended.** This means you shouldn't go to sleep with a fire blazing.
- Keep a fire extinguisher handy.** Stash a fire extinguisher near the fireplace just in case.

#### **Police Department Reminders**

- Please let the police know if you are going on vacation so you can be added to their premises check list.
- There is no overnight parking on city streets, November 1-April 30, 2-7am.
- Studded tires are permitted October 15-May 1.
- Be aware of scams. Do not give out information or send money unless you can verify the request.
- Please license your dogs, honor our leash laws and pick up after your dogs.
- Please be aware of pedestrians. Pedestrians are encouraged to wear reflective clothing and use reflective gear for pets after dark.
