City Hall News

Account Clerk/Typist Position- The City of Sherrill will have a job opening in 2016. The full-time position will be responsible primarily for, but not exclusively, the utility billing for the City. Other job duties include bank deposits, typing correspondence, analytical and summary spreadsheets, accounts payable, daily interaction with the public and all other general office duties. The position is a Civil Service position and the successful candidate will have to take and pass the appropriate Civil Service exam prior to or after appointment to the position. Assessor's News

<u>March 1, 2016</u> is the deadline for filing certain property tax exemption applications with the Assessor's office. Many exemptions including the Senior Citizen's and Enhanced STAR exemptions do not automatically renew and require annual applications and proof of qualifying income.

The Senior Citizen's exemption, with far lower income limits than the Enhanced STAR exemption, is normally based on the previous year's income. For the Senior Citizen's exemption, you must provide proof of your previous year's income using a form such as SS-1099 in addition to tax returns. Please also bring in receipts for out-of-pocket unreimbursed medical and prescription expenses which are used to reduce your income. These expenses include dental, health insurance premium payments, eyeglasses, hearing aids and others as defined by the IRS.

For Enhanced STAR the required age is 65 regardless of when you turn 65 during 2015, and 2014 income. Those applying for an Enhanced STAR exemption may participate in a program whereby the Assessor's office is automatically notified in future years by the State regarding the income eligibility of the applicant. This process is only useful for those filing NYS income tax returns. Applications for the Income Verification Program are available at the Assessor's office. This process cannot be used for any other income-related exemption including the Senior Citizen's exemption.

The Basic STAR property tax exemption, which is not based on age, must be applied for although renewal is not necessary. If you have recently purchased a residence in Sherrill or have not previously applied for the exemption, you may qualify for this significant property tax exemption designed to lower your school tax bill. The residence must be your primary residence to qualify for Basic STAR. Bob Comis, Assessor for the City of Sherrill, has set the following dates and times to process exemptions at City Hall by the March 1 deadline: January 6 & 7-Enhanced STAR; All exemptions- January 28 & 29, February 10-12, 16-19, 23-26 & 29, 9am-12pm; changes to this schedule will be posted at <u>www.sherrillny.org</u>. An appointment can be scheduled by contacting Bob at 264-6362 if that is more convenient. Property owners considering construction next year are welcome to meet with Bob to discuss the potential change to your City assessed value.

The Town of Vernon Assessor's Office, located in Vernon Town Hall, welcomes inquiries from all town property owners, residents, and taxpayers. Sherrill residents can receive some of the same services that they receive from the Sherrill Assessor's Office at the Vernon Office, including assistance relating to exemption applications. The Vernon Assessor's hours are Monday & Thursday, 9am-2pm through February. Frank Laguzza, 829-2587, is Chairman of the Vernon Board of Assessors.

The display includes a representative selection of advertising from 1913- the year Phillips created the most material for Oneida; as well as the central image of the 1915-16 campaign intended to "brand" the Oneida name. Once home to the 19th century utopian Oneida Community (1848-1880), today the 93,000 square foot Oneida Community Mansion House houses a museum, residential apartments, overnight lodging, and banquet and meeting space. Guided tours are available Wednesday through Saturday, 10am-2pm and Sunday at 2pm for a nominal fee. Self-guided tours may be taken during regular business hours. From the Fire Department

It's time to prepare for winter...

(From New York State Winter Preparedness guide) Fire Safety- Wood-burning stoves, fireplaces and heaters can add a cozy glow, but make sure you are using them safely.

- 1. Always keep a screen around an open flame.
- 2. Never use gasoline to start your fireplace.
- 3. Never burn charcoal indoors.
- 4. Do not close the damper when ashes are hot.
- When using alternative heat sources such as a fireplace, woodstove, etc. always make sure you have proper ventilation. Keep curtains, towels and potholders away from hot surfaces.
- 6. Have your chimney checked before the season for creosote buildup- and then clean it.
- 7. Have a fire extinguisher and smoke detectors? ...make sure they work. Establish a well-planned escape route with the entire family.

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning- Carbon monoxide poisoning is a silent, deadly killer claiming about 1,000 lives each year in the United States. Such common items as automotive exhaust, home heating systems and obstructed chimneys can produce the colorless, odorless gas. The gas can also be produced by poorly vented generators, kerosene heaters, gas grills and other items used for cooking and heating when used improperly during the winter months.

- 1. **NEVER** run generators indoors. Open a window slightly when using a kerosene heater.
- 2. **NEVER** use charcoal to cook indoors.
- 3. **NEVER** use a gas oven to heat your home.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include sleepiness, headaches and dizziness. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, dial 911.

Pancake Breakfast- Tired of cooking breakfast? The Fire Department will be holding a pancake breakfast at the station February 7, 8am-12pm. Join us and leave the cooking to us!

Fire Hydrants- Please keep the hydrants near your house clear of snow. This could save firefighters precious minutes if a structure fire should occur. Remember that the house you save could be your own.
