After two years of renovations, the Wastewater Treatment Plant was successfully completed, showcasing the city's commitment to improving infrastructure. The installation of a new Disc Golf Course at Robertson Park and McAllister Elementary School stands out as a collaborative effort between the community, a fundraising group made up of (Becca Piccola, Ray Sawner and Todd Powers), and the city's employees who have planned, purchased, and installed the equipment for the new facility. We are excited of the group's decision to repurpose funds from a potential skate park project into the Disc Golf Course. We also want to thank the Sherrill community for your generosity.

Sherrill Kenwood Water District News

The City of Sherrill and the Sherrill Kenwood Water district for the first time took advantage of the modern method of replacing underground pipes, by utilizing what's known as "pipe bursting".

The pipe bursting technique minimizes the need for disruptive and costly excavation. This means reduced disruption to city streets and right of ways, less environmental impact, and decreased inconvenience to residents and businesses in the area of work. The process involves breaking apart the old cast iron water main while simultaneously pulling through the new high-density polyethylene (HDPE) pipe, effectively replacing the old pipe with a durable and efficient alternative.

High-density polyethylene (HDPE) pipes are well-known for their exceptional durability and resistance to corrosion. They are less prone to leaks, cracks, and other forms of deterioration, which results in a more reliable and long-lasting water distribution system. Additionally, HDPE pipes have smoother interior surfaces, which can improve water flow and reduce the potential for sediment buildup or water quality issues.

The decision to use pipe bursting and high-density polyethylene pipes demonstrates a forward-thinking approach to infrastructure maintenance and improvement. The benefits include increased reliability, longevity, and efficiency of the water distribution system, as well as reduced disruption and environmental impact during the construction process.

As Water Superintendent I want to extend my sincere appreciation to Andy Hoffman and his crew at Center Line Trenchless Construction for their expertise, professionalism, and commitment to enhancing our community's infrastructure. This project serves as an example of how innovative techniques and materials can contribute to the betterment of the Sherrill Kenwood Water District and the City of Sherrill as a whole.

What is the difference between a wet strength box and a carton?

A wet strength box is any kind of box that goes in your refrigerator or freezer like soda can or popsicle boxes. Wet strength boxes have a chemical in them that keep them from breaking down when wet. This chemical cannot be removed from the paper fibers that make up the box, therefore wet strength boxes are not recyclable. Cartons, on the other hand, are recyclable. This is because instead of having a protective chemical mixed with the paper fibers, the carton has a protective waxy coating that can be removed at recycling mills.

How much plastic is actually recycled?

The Authority has one of the most comprehensive recycling systems in New York State. We accept the items that we do (whether plastic or another material) because we have an outlet for that material to be recycled. It would be a waste of money, time and energy to advertise that we accept plastic for recycling just to only collect a few types and send the rest to the landfill. Of the plastic that comes to the recycling center, about 10% is landfilled because of contamination from "wishcycling" (or, putting items in the recycling bin hoping that it will be recycled), dirty recyclables, and lack of education. We have one of the largest accepted lists in the state due to our single stream processing system and therefore can accept more types of the many kinds of plastic than our surrounding counties. In 2022, we marketed 2,070 tons or 4,140,000 pounds of plastic for recycling.

Does it matter if plastic bottles or glass jars have their lids/caps on?

When you are recycling plastic bottles and jars, you can rinse them out and put the lids right back on them. The plastic and metal lids are recyclable but may not be recovered for recycling if they are not on their original container

Are pizza boxes recyclable?

This is something that we leave to residents' discretion. If the box has a lot of grease or cheese stuck to it, then it would be better to put it in the garbage. Otherwise, they can be recycled.

Why do my garbage and recyclables go in the same truck?


Some waste haulers use split body trucks. These trucks collect garbage and recycling at the same time, helping cut down on the time it takes to complete a collection route. When they arrive at our facilities, the garbage side of the truck is emptied in the transfer station, and the recycling side of the truck is emptied in the recycling center. If you have concerns with how your waste is being collected, you can contact your waste hauler directly.

Where can I get rid of paint when the Authority's HHW facility is closed?

Paint is now accepted for recycling at participating retailers through PaintCare, a program of the American Coatings Association that was established in New York State in 2022. When you buy paint there is now a small added fee which helps fund the PaintCare program. Paint that is recycled through this program is either reused or processed into fuel.
